

The Dr. Susan Love Research Foundation and the Avon Foundation launched the Love/Avon Army of Women, a groundbreaking initiative that will partner women with breast cancer researchers to find the key to what causes breast cancer and take science beyond a cure to prevention. Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation Announces 2008 Nursing Grant Recipients

Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation (ALSF), a leader driving research for pediatric cancer, announced the awarding of the 2008 Nursing Grants to four institutions across the country: Children's Hospital of Philadelphia in Pennsylvania; Children's Hospital and Regional Medical Center in Seattle, WA; Texas Children's Hospital in Houston; and the University of Kansas Medical Center in Kansas City. The grants, designed to improve the quality of life for young patients with cancer and their families, will total almost \$240,000 during the course of a two-year period.

Having awarded 80 medical research grants to 40 institutions and universities, ALSF felt it was important to invest in research enabling nurses to find better ways to care for children undergoing cancer treatment. ALSF emerged from the frontyard lemonade stand of Alexandra "Alex" Scott, a pediatric patient with cancer (1996– 2004). At the age of 4, Alex announced that she wanted to hold a lemonade stand to raise money to help find a cure for all children with cancer. Since Alex held that first stand, the Foundation bearing her name has raised more than \$25 million toward fulfilling Alex's dream of finding a cure, funding research projects nationally.

"Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation is proud to continue our nursing grants program for a second year," said Jay Scott, Alex's father and executive director. "It is extremely important to fund research, but it is equally important to provide patients with a good quality of life while they undergo treatment. We want to show our support for just how integral these nurses are during treatment and recovery against this deadly disease."
